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regarded by many as one of the leading works of this century this novel documents the resistance to fascism in europe and within germany during wwii

a major literary event the publication of the final volume of peter weiss s three volume novel the aesthetics of resistance makes one of the towering works of twentieth century german literature available to english speaking readers for the first time weiss s crowning achievement the aesthetics of resistance spans the period from the late 1930s to the end of world war ii dramatizing antifascist resistance and the rise and fall of proletarian political parties in europe volume iii initially published in 1981 teems with characters many of whom are based on historical figures it commences in may of 1940 as the narrator s parents flee nazi forces in eastern europe and reunite with their son in sweden while in stockholm the narrator and other communist activists living in exile struggle to build structures in the german underground the story then follows communist resistance fighter charlotte bischoff as she is smuggled to bremen on a freighter in berlin she contacts the

narrator's friends and joins the red orchestra resistance group soon the gestapo cracks the underground group's code arrests a number of its members and takes them to plötzensee prison where most of them are executed featuring the narrator's meditations on paintings sculpture and literature throughout the aesthetics of resistance demonstrates the affinity between political resistance and art ultimately weiss argues that we must look to art for new models of political action and social understanding

a major literary event the publication of this masterly translation makes one of the towering works of twentieth century german literature available to english speaking readers for the first time the three volume novel the aesthetics of resistance is the crowning achievement of peter weiss the internationally renowned dramatist best known for his play marat sade the first volume presented here was initially published in germany in 1975 the third and final volume appeared in 1981 just six months before weiss's death spanning the period from the late 1930s to world war ii this historical novel dramatizes antifascist resistance and the rise and fall of proletarian political parties in europe living in berlin in 1937 the unnamed narrator and his peers sixteen and seventeen year old working class students seek ways to express their hatred for the nazi regime they meet in museums and galleries and in their discussions they explore the affinity between political resistance and art the connection at the heart of weiss's novel weiss suggests that meaning lies in embracing resistance no matter how intense the oppression and that we must look to art for new models of political action and social understanding the novel includes extended meditations on paintings sculpture and literature moving from the berlin underground to the front lines of the spanish civil war and on to other parts of europe the story teems with characters almost all of whom are based on historical figures the aesthetics of resistance is one of the truly great works of postwar german literature and an essential resource for understanding twentieth century german history

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the history of the last fifty or 100 or 150 years has been accompanied by a constant flow of statements of practices of declarations of dissatisfaction with regard to prevailing conditions when something is able to reach from the margins of society into its very center something mostly unorganized and unruly sometimes violent rarely controllable it forges ahead in the form of a protest this takes place in real or virtual spaces and is accomplished by likewise real or virtual bodies the spaces and the bodies to which the protest relates are the spaces of politics and society it masterfully and creatively draws on contemporary signs and symbols subverting and transforming them to engender new aesthetics and meanings thereby opening up a space that eludes control from a position of powerlessness irony subversion and provocation are its tools for pricking small but palpable pinholes into the controlling system of rule this book presents and reflects on present and past forms of protest and looks at marginalized communities practices of resistance from a wide variety of perspectives

since the beginnings of african cinema the realm of beauty on screen has been treated with suspicion by directors and critics alike james s williams explores an exciting new generation of african directors including abderrahmane sissako mahamat saleh haroun fanta régina nacro alain gomis newton i aduaka jean pierre bekolo and mati diop who have begun to reassess and embrace the concept of cinematic beauty by not reducing it to ideological critique or the old ideals of pan africanism locating the aesthetic within a range of critical fields the rupturing of narrative spectacle and violence by montage the archives of the everyday in the afropolis the plurivocal mysteries of sound and language male intimacy and desire the borderzones of migration and transcultural drift this study reveals the possibility for new non conceptual kinds of beauty in african cinema abstract material migrant erotic convulsive queer through close readings of key works such as life on earth 1998 the night of truth 2004 bamako 2006 daratt dry season 2006 a screaming man 2010 tey today 2012 the pirogue 2012 mille soleils 2013 and timbuktu 2014 williams argues that contemporary african filmmakers are proposing propitious ethical forms of relationality and intersubjectivity these stimulate new modes of cultural resistance and transformation that serve to redefine the transnational and the cosmopolitan as well as the very notion of the political in postcolonial art cinema

effective visual communication has become an essential strategy for grassroots political activists who use images to publicly express resistance and make their claims visible in the struggle for political power however this aesthetics of resistance is also employed by political and economic elites for their own purposes

making it increasingly difficult to distinguish from the aesthetics of rule through illuminating case studies of street art in buenos aires bogotá caracas and mexico city the aesthetics of rule and resistance explores the visual strategies of persuasion and meaning making employed by both rulers and resisters to foster self legitimization identification and mobilization

the book as an outcome of jacobi s artistic research provides an understanding of the aesthetic language that emerges from these events building on how the uprisings on tahrir square led into the global wave of protests in 2011 2012 like occupy wall street in usa m15 in spain gezi park in istanbul and how against this background an aesthetics of resistance articulates how politics of consent are reconstituted through performative acts even when these are resituated into complex democratic and mediatized fronts to challenge power terms like active time aesthetics another world apotheosis of revolt barricades black bloc cloning collective body constructed situation dead time eros effect exodus headless kettle militant multitext policing resonance sci fi warriors sense event temporary autonomous zone transcendence troublemakers turmoil verfremdung and violence are explored both as discursive themes and as aesthetic tools in the scripts and performances collected or performed by jacobi and others referring to german writer peter weiss s seminal novel aesthetics of resistance artist hito steyerl writes in her essay aesthetics of resistance that the novel establishes a genealogy of aesthetic research which is related to the history of emancipatory struggles throughout the 20th century taking up the title aesthetics of resistance jacobi explicitly connects his project to this genealogy of aesthetic research articulating how contemporary political activism performs radical political imagery grounded in collective improvisation and an inventive contextual consciousness

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
